
Survey Methodology

- Telephone survey among 800 K-12 teachers who are members of the American Federation of Teachers, including 405 primary school teachers and 358 secondary school teachers
- ◆ Survey dates March 27 30, 2013
- Overall margin of error = ±3.5 percentage points among all respondents, higher among subgroups



Teachers Overwhelmingly Approve Of Common Core State Standards

Based on what you know about the Common Core State Standards* and the expectations they set for children, do you approve or disapprove of your state's decision to adopt them?



79% are very/fairly familiar with CCSS


80% are closely following implementation.

But Teachers Worry That Assessments Will Begin Before Instructional Practice Is Aligned

How worried are you that the new assessments will begin – and students, teachers, and schools will be held accountable for the results – before everyone involved understands the new standards, and before instructional practice has been fully aligned with the standards?



53% of all teachers favor adoption of CCSS, but worry that assessments will precede understanding and aligned practice.



Half Have Received Inadequate Or No CCSS Professional Development


Have you received any professional development or training related to the CCSS? Was that training adequate in preparing you to teach to the standards?

More emphasis on testing and teaching to test



Teachers Favor Moratorium On Consequences For One Year After Full Implementation

Support For Proposals Related To CCSS And Aligned Assessments

Require school districts to reach an agreement with the union representing teachers on a plan for implementation of the Common Core standards



Establish a moratorium on high-stakes consequences for students, teachers, and schools until the Common Core standards and related assessments are fully in use for one year







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
